We thought the name "**Cerise and Blue**" was appropriate to our school and hence the alteration.

Rosalie Old Boys Association

For the past few years, the Marist Rosalie Old Boys have been functioning as a social group and holding lunches, producing Newsletters and in 2019 holding a hugely successful 90th. Anniversary Re-union.

The time has come to formalise our Association and re-register the "Rosalie Old Boy's Association". The Association ceased to function in approximately 2010. The reason we need to do this is to follow the regulations laid down in the Associations Incorporations Act 1981 and ensure that activities which are conducted are legal. We need to give our association a proper structure and rules to follow.

This means we need a Constitution and Management Structure which functions under a set of guidelines. To ensure a streamlined process and to enable an expedited approval process, it was proposed that the model rules provided by the Office of Fair Trading be adopted.

We needed to hold a meeting almost immediately to pass motions to enable the re-registration of the association. We held this meeting via teleconference on 11th. June to pass the motions documented in the minutes below.

All officers elected will be temporary only. A full meeting will be scheduled within the next six months when all office-bearer's positions will become vacant and elections will be held to appoint permanent office bearers until the AGM in 2021.


At that time, we will streamline the constitution and tailor it more to our suitability. One of the items which requires consideration is to change the name from "Rosalie Old Boy's Association". I have had many comments asking why is the word "Marist" is non-existent. This needs serious consideration.

Obviously, the COVID-19 situation will have an impact on when and where we hold the full meeting.

Our Association belongs to its members. It relies fully on their contributions to be successful. We need input from them.

Committee Member – Chris Begley, Tony Buckley, Tony Farrell, Owen Strath, Darren Cann


OUTCOME: PASSED Moved By: Chris Begley Seconded: Tony Buckley

- Jim Griffith – Discussed the matter of a potential patron for the association. It was discussed that Saint Marcellin Champagnat was the current patron.



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AGM

It is planned that the AGM for the Rosalie Old Boy's Association will be held within the next six months.

The venue, date and time, **cannot be confirmed at this stage, because of the Covid-19 pandemic. All precautions will be taken at that time to conform to recommendations for social distancing and the health and welfare of all of our members.**

Nominations for Elective Office

Nominations will be called for President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and five (5) members for the Management Committee.

These positions will be voted on at the AGM. If you wish to nominate for any of the above positions, you must conform to the conditions laid down for membership in the Model Rules adopted by the Marist Rosalie Old Boy's Association.

Rules for associations

Association's such as The Rosalie Old Boy's Association must have a written set of rules (or '*constitution*') to govern how it runs. The rules take effect when the association is incorporated.

The rules must set out:

- how the association operates
- the rights available to members
- how the management committee works
- how meetings will run.


For the Rosalie Old Boy's situation, we have chosen to adopt the standard Model Rules and will modify these for suitability for us at our AGM.

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Commemorative Ties

A few weeks ago, we ran a campaign to raise funds for our Association because we needed to replenish the Bank Account. We need to initiate projects such as preserving the history and memory of the school.

There is large amount of historic memorabilia that we have which needs preservation and a place to call home. Items such as photographs, records and scrap books should never be lost. In the current age of technology, digital records are the perfect way to do this. Like everything else it comes at a cost.

Therefore, we considered selling ties as a way to raise money.

We sent out an "Expression of Interest" to members to ensure we could meet the minimum order quantity from our supplier. After the second day of responses came in, we knew that we would be proceeding with ordering the ties.

We put a closing date for orders as 12th. June; our results exceed expectations.

We expected to receive a sample of the tie soon after the order closing date. After our approval of the sample the ties would go into production.

Because of the Covid-19 pandemic delivery times are slow and we have not as yet received the sample tie.

We are now able to extend order taking until the sample arrives which is expected to be 30th. June.

We will be ordering a surplus of ties, but only a small quantity. If you have not yet ordered we may still be able to supply your requirement as long as you place your order quickly. Cancellations of orders may also be an opportunity to buy.

The surplus we ordered is intended for guys who join as members later and did not have the opportunity to order in the initial stages of selling the ties.


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Ashgrove Marist College



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Rosalie Bursary

In 2019, the announcement was made by Marist College Ashgrove for establishment of a **Rosalie Marist College Bursary** for families of boys in need, so they can be offered education in the Marist tradition.

Each year the bursary is offered to a selected student. The family of the boy offered the bursary will be asked if they wish to be named. They are given that choice as a matter of privacy.

We are proud to communicate that some of our **Rosalie past students have made donations** to the Bursary and we are hoping more will contribute as time goes on.

The best way to give is through the "Strength in Numbers" program. The reason being is that this program becomes the mechanism so that Tax Deductions can be made for any monies donated.

Strength in Numbers

"Strength in Numbers" is a program that is aimed providing a Marist Education for deserving boys who would otherwise miss out due to family circumstances.

SOMETIMES IT IS DIFFICULT TO SEE HOW, AS INDIVIDUALS, WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO OTHERS IN OUR COMMUNITY, HOWEVER COLLECTIVELY AS A GROUP WE CAN.

The Champagnat Trust's new collective fundraiser 'Strength in Numbers' is an opportunity for groups of Old Boys to come together to maximise the impact of their tax-deductible donations, big or small.

How the Program Works






By all means distribute this Newsletter to anyone who might be interested in reading it. If it is an "Old Boy" who does not receive it from us please send his details.





PETER SAW TRAINING AND SERVICE IN AUSTRALIA AND OVERSEAS BEFORE BEING POSTED ON ACTIVE SERVICE AS A LEADING AIRCRAFTMAN (ELECTRICAL FITTER) TO NUMBER 2 SQUADRON (CANBERRAS) AT PHAN RANG AIR BASE, NINH THUAN PROVINCE, IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM FROM APRIL 1968 TO APRIL 1969. NUMBER 2 SQUADRON FORMED PART OF UNITED STATES AIR FORCE 35TH TACTICAL FIGHTER WING.

ON RETURN TO AUSTRALIA PETER COMPLETED POSTINGS IN AUSTRALIA AND MALAYSIA. HE WAS COMMISSIONED AS AN OFFICER TO SUPPLY AND RETIRED IN MELBOURNE AS A SQUADRON LEADER ON 17 JULY 1998.

DURING HIS SERVICE PETER EARNED THE FOLLOWING AWARDS:





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At the end of May I received a telephone from Denis Deering to pass on the news of the passing of his mate and fellow Rosalie Old Boy, Peter Foley.


In recent times Peter has been debilitated through severe illness.


May he rest in peace.



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From the Vault

We receive quite a few contributions from "Old Boys". Many of these are reflections of their days at the school. They make interesting reading. If you want to tell your story then this Newsletter belongs to you and we will always make space for your memories

If we missed your story in this Newsletter, please prompt me and even send it to me again. Like many of us the memory is not quite what it used to be but nevertheless they are our own personal recollections.

The Early 50's

Early History

ROSALIE — The early '50's

1950 was a Holy Year for the Universal Church. Representing the parish of Rosalie at Rome for the ceremonies was the then Father McCarthy who had just completed the new building for the Marist Brothers' School. The College Staff in 1950 was Brother Gilbertus (Headmaster), Brothers Cuthman, Reginald, Norman, Roland, Ernest and Mr. R. S. Amedel. Brother Hugh Thomas joined the Staff in July.

On flicking through the records of the early 1950's, one immediately is impressed by some dramatic water rescues. Fourteen-year-old Gordon Funk (a pupil) rescued Patrick Henry Ryan, a 65 year old widower of South Brisbane, whom he sighted floating down the Brisbane River near the Grey Street Bridge. Later at the 1954 Swimming Carnival, the Daily Telegraph reported "the starter Fred Shelton dived in fully clothed to help a boy in distress at the Rosalie Marist swims at the Valley Pool last night. The boy was in the Under 13 Freestyle and only went twenty yards up the lane, when he started to sink". One hopes that there is no boy these days in the Under 13's who cannot do at least 25 metres Freestyle.

The main achievement of the period was the purchase in 1954 of our playing fields by the then Headmaster — Brother Cyprian. Formerly a dairy farm, Brother Cyprian had the area bulldozed. The old dairy bails were converted into dressing rooms (presumably this is the shed in front of the present sunken gardens). All families at the school were requested to raise £5 for the paying of the fields. The boys of the College spent a day at the fields picking up pebbles. (Each boy was required to bring a jam tin to school for that purpose). On another day each boy had to bring a sugar bag full of couch grass, and a day was spent planting. (Walkathons sound much easier affairs!) The result was that on the opening day — mid-1955 — Rosalie had one of the finest sporting fields in Queensland — or so claimed Max Hawkins in the current Telegraph.

Curiously the farm, formerly owned by Lutton White, had been called "Levalle" (L for Lutton, Evalle was his wife's name). Its new name "Lavalla" (after the French village where the first ever Marist school was built) retains some of the flavour of the former owners.

Scholastic and sporting results were high through the period.

Also in 1956 Rosalie won its first cricket Premiership since 1936. (We've come a long way since then.)

Finally, we note this intriguing story in the "Courier-Mail" 1954:

"The Marist Brothers' Sacred Heart College at Rosalie will soon begin work on a street garden which they hope will win a prize in The Courier-Mail Gardens for the Queen competition. The College Principal, Brother Cyprian, said yesterday that although time was short he was confident that the now brown area would bloom for the Queen, and would stand a good chance in the competition."

The result of that competition remains unrecorded!





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Vince McCosker

Any student around Rosalie in the 1950's and 1960's would remember Vince for his involvement with the school, especially the cadets.

Vincent McCosker (1923–1987) was a Medical Orderly with the Australian Infantry Forces during World War 2. He was one of the 64 survivors on the Australian Hospital Ship [AHS Centaur](#), a hospital ship which torpedoed and sunk by a Japanese submarine off the coast of Queensland, Australia, on 14 May 1943. Of the 332 medical personnel and civilian crew aboard, 268 died, including 63 of the 65 army personnel.

Vince still has family descendants today who are members of the “Old Boys” Association. Vince was truly one of those special people who any school, business or organisation would class as a “Treasure” to have as part of its history.

VINCENT McCosker still doesn't know what to make of the ugly sides of human nature in Australia.

Thirty-eight years ago he arrived in Brisbane on a stretcher a survivor of the hospital ship Centaur.

And waterside workers greeted the badly-burned youngster, barely out of his teens with cries of “You'll be sorry.”

Last weekend ockerism continued to bedevil him.

“From remarks made it seems that some people still won't accept that we were on an unarmed non-combatant vessel that was protected under the Geneva Convention,” he said.

“They still believe that the Japanese were entitled to sink us.”

The Courier-Mail on Saturday and again yesterday carried reports proving — on the basis of exhaustive research — that the Centaur had never carried troops or munitions.

Japanese submariners conceded that one of their number, Commander Hajime Nakagawa, had torpedoed the brilliantly marked hospital ship off Stradbroke Island on May 14, 1943.

But they argued that poor visibility may have been the cause of a tragedy that inflamed public opinion and led to years of malicious rumor.

McCosker, one of five Brisbane men among the 332 people on board, had celebrated his 20th birthday only 10 days before the sinking.

And he was among the 64 people who survived 36 hours of clinging to wreckage before rescue ships arrived.

The reports resurrected memories of hurt and loss he had thought buried long ago. “I just haven't been able to sleep for the last two nights,” he said.

McCosker figures prominently in a brief but authoritative history of the sinking of the Centaur by Canadian researcher Christopher Milligan.

Asleep in a lower-deck bunk at the stern of the ship, he was literally blown from the cabin and, with a man who was to become his brother-in-law — Eric Taylor, of Newcastle — was one of the last to leave the sinking ship.

And still the rumors persist

Painstaking research by a Canadian writer has shown that the hospital ship Centaur — torpedoed by a Japanese submarine off Stradbroke Island in 1943 — was not armed and was not carrying munitions. But a Brisbane man who survived the tragedy, in which 268 people died, has found that some people still believe the ship was a fair target for the Japanese. DON PETERSEN spoke to him.

Both men were covered with fuel oil. A distress flare, lit by another survivor hit McCosker and caused third degree burns.

Barely able to move, he stood for nearly two days on a precariously-balanced crowded piece of wreckage, the roof of the wheelhouse and chartroom.

“There were times when I guess that I lapsed into a coma,” he recalled. “But cruising sharks were pretty good at keeping us awake.

“The awful part was seeing ships and aircraft passing by but not seeing us. At one stage we must have been only about 10 miles from Point Lookout but then were carried 70 miles to sea again.”

Vincent McCosker today rejects the Japanese contention that the submarine commander must have mistaken the ship for something else.

“The torpedo hit us just in front of the big Red Cross in the middle of the ship,” he said.

“I'm not bitter, but it's almost as if he was aiming at the cross. Anyway it's too long ago. But I cannot get over the reaction of our own people.”

Rumors of Centaur contravening the rules of war began immediately and continued, he said.

“Almost always it would be civilians saying these things and there'd be fights every Anzac Day. Some survivor or his relative or mate would get mad and it would be on.

“The government could have stopped the whole thing with a simple statement but then General MacArthur stepped in or Churchill or somebody else, and Canberra buried it.

“We couldn't even contact other survivors. There were locked doors and

silence everywhere. Nobody wanted to know us, we were sort of untouchable.”

The great pity, McCosker said, was that so many survivors or their families or friends had died before Milligan's research was done.

“But now it has been published and the rumors are scotched,” he said.


“The good name of the Centaur and those who died in her is restored and that should be the end of it.”

And maybe it will be. The ugly Australians have been effectively answered and McCosker has come to vie them for what they are.

“Just plain ignorant,” I guess.

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Feast of the Sacred Heart

On Friday 19th June we celebrated the Feast of the Sacred Heart. The Church and Parish where many of us were baptised, made our First Communion, Confirmation, where we were married and in some case even our children were married there is so named as The Sacred Heart, Rosalie. Many of our family even had the final celebration of their life in that distinctive church which proudly sits at the top of the hill at the end of Given Terrace in Paddington.

Vince Hodge, a long-time member of the parish generously provided some photos and a story regarding the history of the church.

The photo on the right is the 1898 timber church. It was used as a school from 1906 on its original site and then moved over in 1917 to what is now the main two-story brick school building from 1948. In 1917 they wanted to build the Brick Church. So, from 1917 to 1947 that original timber church stood on the other side of Fernberg Road and served as a parish school (1917-1928) and then as the Marist Brothers School (1928-1947). It was demolished and replaced by the current brick building that is used as Conference Centre today.

The timber building in the photo below is the Second Church from 1907. It was destroyed by fire in 1977. It was the Infants School building where children in Prep., Grade 1 and Grade 2 were schooled before they moved to the convent further up Given Terrace and next to the Nun's Convent.




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Sacred Heart Window and Altar

The Sacred Heart Window in the 1918 Rosalie Catholic Church was dedicated "In memory of" (IMO) to a couple: Patrick James Moroney (1872- 28/01/1934) and Margaret Thomasine (nee Flannery; 1883 - 15/08/1940) respectively.

The window was almost certainly installed as part of the events of 1942. They had married 30th. April, 1912 at St. Stephen's Cathedral.

Patrick had come from Laidley and had four brothers and three sisters.

His wife had grown up at her family's home at Qualtrough St., Woolloongabba/ Norman Park.

He gave 34 years to Qld. Police Service and retired in 1931.

The Moroney house was at 7 Elizabeth St. It carried the name "WaraHills". The Flannery family home at Norman Park had been named "Waratah". I assume the name of the Elizabeth St property is a combination of "Wara" and "Hills" of "Paddington Hills".

The Parents and the three Moroney boys are interred at Toowong Cemetery – Patrick Richard (1913-1986); Kevin Francis (1919-1957); James Anthony (1917-1969).

None of the brothers were ever married.


The property has been recently significantly renovated under new owners. It is Interesting that Mr. Moroney had been a Police Officer much as had Mr. Richard Walsh.


The 1942 Sacred Heart Altar was donated by the widow and family of Richard Walsh. He had died aged 40 years leaving his widow, Julia, and 5 children. One of his grand-children, Joan, became a Mercy Religious Sister and she took the name Sister Carita -Latin for "Heart". Another, Francis, became a Christian Brother.

The co-location of the window and the altar is unlikely to have been a mere coincidence. The two families were most likely closely allied through these multiple affiliations and their 1942 donations "sit-together" as a quite natural emanation of such a likely closeness.

**“The people from the garbage dump saved me”
- Fr Frank Gerry SVD, celebrating 65 years
as a missionary**

As a Divine Word Missionary for 65 years, Fr Frank Gerry SVD, says he has had many wonderful experiences, but none touched him and transformed him as much as his ministry and friendship with the people who lived on the garbage dump in the Philippines.

“When I was working in formation in the Philippines I attached myself to one of the priests going down to the garbage dump every month,” he says. “And when he went away, I went down and did Mass in Tagalog for the people.

“It was a very important experience for me, because I was at a low point in my own life at that stage. I suppose you could call it a mid-life transition.

“But the people at that garbage dump received me with their hospitality, their humanity and their hope, and really, they saved me.”

Fr Frank recalls that the chapel at the dump was dedicated to the Mystery of the Resurrection.

“Imagine that, a chapel for the resurrection there in the midst of all that decay,” he says.

“After about three months one of the local women came to me and said, ‘we hope you keep coming here’. I did keep coming there for two to three years and gradually a resurrection occurred in me.

“Of my six years assigned to the Philippines, the time spent at the garbage dump was the most important and the most enjoyable.”

Fr Frank, who now lives in retirement, was born and bred in Brisbane and remembers being entranced as a teenager by the story of the Dorish Maru, the ship on which more than 100 SVD missionaries, Holy Spirit Sisters and civilians were taken prisoner by the Japanese during WWII and then shot at by American air forces.

“All through my young years I had an interest in the Missions. There was something enchanting and inviting about the mission fields,” Fr Frank says.

Responding to his missionary call, the young Frank joined the SVD in 1948 and in 1951, he left Brisbane to undertake formation and theological study in the United States.


Following his final vows and ordination, Fr Frank was appointed to the AUS Province as Vocations Director, and then Novice Master. In 1979 he undertook a Research Fellowship at Yale Divinity School, spending a year working with the renowned spiritual writer Henri Nouwen. He was then assigned to the Philippines, where he became Assistant Novice Master to 90 students at the Divine Word Seminary in Tagaytay. In 1986 he returned to Sydney and was elected Provincial.

Proceeding the assembly, staff and students were hosted in the Cyprian Pavilion for morning tea.




The Spirit Of ROSA Lives On

On 29th July 1926, His Grace, Archbishop Dubig laid the foundation stone for the Marist Monastery on Fernberg Road in Rosalie. This was to become the site of the first Marist College in Queensland which opened on 28th January, 1929. The number of both boarders and day students increased to such an extent that, in 1909, the Marist Brothers purchased St Jude's Seminary at Ashgrove for the site of a new school. In 1940, 120 day students and all boarders transferred to St Mary's College Ashgrove (now Marist College Ashgrove).

In 2006 a decision was made to close Marist College Rosalie at the end of 2008, ending 80 years of education in the Marist tradition. While the College may cease to exist, the ROSA spirit will continue to live on.

This Crucifix has been presented to Marist College Ashgrove in recognition of the historical connection between the two Colleges. In doing that, there is also the wish that many of our young people continue to be provided with the opportunity of an education based on the charism of St Marcellin Champagnol.




