President's Address

AGM Welcome Address – 2022 Marist Rosalie Old Boys' Assn. Inc.

Good morning and welcome to the 2022 Annual General Meeting of the Marist Rosalie Old Boys Association.

I would like to welcome those Old Boys who are also joining us online through Zoom.

At this time, I will ask Jaccie Dawson to deal with apologies.

I would now like to invite Clifford Cleven to read the Acknowledgement of Country.

As our history is one of being a Catholic School, we will start today's proceedings with an opening prayer. I would like to invite Brother Neville Solomon to recite this prayer.

We have just completed another extremely busy and challenging year for our Association.

During 2022 we held a number of events including: -

- The Annual Reunion
- The Rosalie Rugby Tribute Match
- The Annual Marist Sports lunch attended by 1st. XV Rugby Team members from 1962, 1972 and 1982.
- The Annual Marist Vintage Lunch.

In 2023 we will once again be involved in the same, or similar events.

Today, I am delighted to report that our membership has continued to increase, and we are now approaching 1,500 registered members.

We have spent a large amount of time searching for missing members and updating the database. Our strategy has been; if we increase our members database this would automatically translate to having more attendees at events throughout the year.

Unfortunately, our thinking was flawed and there are many reasons for this, including geographical location of members and the age of many Past Students. We had a less than expected turnout to the Annual Reunion and the numbers were also lower for The Rosalie Tribute 1st XV Rugby match compared with the previous year.

There were mitigating circumstances for the lower than usual number at the reunion this year. As you will remember the evening of this event experienced horrific weather. We had a large number of cancellations due to road closures and people's homes had severe flood damage. We were expecting guests from outside Brisbane, but travel became impossible for a number of people.

The Rosalie Rugby Tribute match the following day was also postponed due to the condition of the oval. This game was eventually played on the final day of the AIC season; by that time momentum and enthusiasm had waned. We had anticipated a greater attendance at this game.



After seven seasons of playing in various versions of the Rosalie colours, this was the first year the game was played as a Premiership match, not a trial. We had been lobbying for this for a few years.

The Annual Marist Vintage Lunch was well attended, and numbers were consistent with previous years, although, 2017 remains the largest attendance for this event.

At our AGM in 2021 we stated that one of our main goals was to analyse our purpose, mission and vision. Those that attended will remember Josh Kindred providing an overview of our initial workshop. We plan to continue with this project in 2023 and we want to encourage more old boys to be involved.

In the most recent publication of our Cerise and Blue we communicated that we plan to hold a half day workshop in 2023. Invitees would include either Past College Captains, or a representative from their year, if those captains are unavailable.

The purpose of this workshop is to continue defining our future so that we are working for the common good of the Old Boys of Rosalie. We want those attendees to help us with that project and assist us to increase the membership numbers in our database by locating missing Old Boys.

We have contact details for almost all College Captains going back to 1960 so we are hopeful of a good attendance. In the coming weeks, an invitation will be emailed to recipients to attend this workshop. We have no objection to having more than one attendee from any given year if it is going to be beneficial to the success of this event.

At our most recent Committee meeting it was agreed we do not want to just hold social events. We want to do something stronger to ensure the "Spirit of Rosa" lives on.

At the end of 2021, our committee made a small donation to Australian Marist Solidarity (AMS) on behalf of our members. Following this, some Old Boys communicated to us they would also like to donate to our cause, one even matching our donation. All Committee members present agreed AMS was an extremely worthy recipient.

For those that are unaware of what AMS do: they work to ensure that all young people have access to educational opportunities. AMS believe education has the power to eradicate poverty. With our help, AMS can support grassroots movements run by local people, to empowering them to make a change in their community.

Working across Asia and the Pacific, AMS projects focus on providing access to education for vulnerable young people, building facilities for the future to ensure safe spaces for learning, and investing in resilience and readiness to help young people who need a little extra support to thrive in learning environments.

Rosalie was a school who educated students from many ethnic backgrounds. Many families arrived from overseas countries to Australia to escape the turmoil of life in their homelands. It could be argued for many years Rosa was the largest multicultural school in Brisbane. One of the things these people needed help with was the opportunity of a strong education for their families. The Marist Brothers stepped up to fulfill that role in their lives.

One of our goals for the coming year is to ask our members to donate money. Just the price of one cup coffee each per month, can make an enormous difference. With the funds we raise we can donate to those schools in most need. We can sponsor Bursaries and even sporting events which will assist those schools to develop and mature.



Our plan is to appoint a sub-committee to manage raising funds for this worthy cause. We need volunteers for that purpose. If you are interested in a supporting role, please speak to Jaccie Dawson or me after the AGM.

We will liaise with AMS annually to decide on who should benefit from the money we raise. We need Old Boys to embrace this project for the cause to be successful.

What greater honour could there be than to make sure Rosalie is remembered for helping people receive an education in The Marist tradition.

The Main mission of the Brothers is to make a difference in the world by showing young people that they are loved, safe and cared for. The Marists minister in school settings, parishes, retreats, spiritual accompaniments, at-risk youth settings, young adult ministries, and overseas missions.

Today you will hear from the CEO of Australia Marist Solidarity, Bec Bromhead, who will provide you with an insight on the struggles and hope of people in our region today.





FOGI (FRIENDS OF GALLIPOLI INCORPORATED)

Another important project we are working on for 2023 is called FOGI or Friends of Gallipoli Incorporated.

A few months ago, I received a call from Lt. Colonel Garry Spencer (retired) who was an old boy of the school and is part of FOGI.

FOGI has been instrumental in organising trees which have been grafted from the original Lone Pine Tree at Gallipoli. I am sure anyone who has read the history of the Gallipoli Campaign will be aware of the significance of the Lone Pine Tree.

A number of these trees have been donated to schools around Australia and they have been planted in a prominent place in the grounds of schools in memory of those who served or lost their lives in ADF campaigns.

Garry approached me and asked if we were interested in accepting a tree for our school. Because we do not have a current school and the site at Fernberg road is unsuitable we decided that gifting the tree to Marist Ashgrove in memory of Marist Rosalie and Ashgrove Old Boys who served in the ADF would be appropriate.



I approached Ashgrove through their Old Boys' Association and spoke to the Head of College, Michael Newman. Their enthusiasm for the idea was overwhelming.

It is envisaged the tree will be presented to Ashgrove by a diplomat from the Turkish government. It is planned that other dignitaries will be invited to the event. The tree would be given a place of significance in the college grounds and a plaque would be placed at the foot of the tree with both the Rosalie and Ashgrove badges.

Details for this event are still to confirmed.

AGM 2020

Some of you will recall the AGM and lunch held in 2020 in this very room when the Brisbane Catholic Education Executive Director, Pam Betts, addressed attendees.

At that lunch Pam spoke about capturing the spirit of Marist College Rosalie so that story of our great College would be preserved in the future. Pam also said she was unsure how this will look – but BCE would engage with myself and the Old Boys to explore possibilities.

In 2021 everything went awry with the emergence of Covid-19. BCE and the Catholic Education system was in chaos, as was most of our country. Pam is now no longer part of BCE and has been replaced by Dr. Sally Towns.

It has always been made clear to me by BCE that Rosalie would never re-open in Paddington. That being the case my thrust has been that we should fight hard to ensure the memory of our great school lives on by having the history of Rosa, the school motto and the "Cerise and Blue" instilled in a new school opened by BCE that would operate in The Marist tradition.



There was discussion between Mark Elliott, Regional Director of Marist Schools Australia and myself about this strategy and we discussed the location of a school that was a strong possibility where this could occur. That school was in South Caloundra and called "Aura". Earlier this year three names were put forward for that school and these were Champagnat, Sacred Heart and Notre Dame. We were strong protagonists for the name of Champagnat, but the final choice of the name is Notre Dame Aura. Notre Dame was due to open in 2024 but due to budget constraints the construction of this school has been postponed for a further twelve months.

Recently, I had a meeting with Dr. Towns and Mark Elliot. While no firm plans were established, we did discuss that there will be opportunities in the future for Rosalie to have a footprint in a new school.

Following that meeting I sat down with Mark Elliott, and it was decided that our best strategy to increase the chances of Rosalie being part of a new school would be to support it via bursaries and sporting awards in memory of Rosa. For example, we might have the Stan Pilecki Medal or Trophy for the most outstanding Rugby player from the school or it might be an educational bursary in honour of Rosalie for academic achievement.

We will need to be proactive by submitting a proposal to the new school when the Board and Principal are appointed. Marist Schools Australia are willing to assist us with that project. This could be highly successful given any new school has no history or criterions for various achievements.

We need to search our database for the skills to prepare this proposal and we will be looking to our members for this expertise to ensure the likelihood of success.

I have always been a great believer that no one achieves anything without a plan.

In 2018, when we re-established the Rosalie Old Boy's working group; we could never have predicted its evolution and envisaged the amazing support we would receive from past students and external organisations.

To be successful on our journey, we need to summon the right skills from our ranks to achieve the goals we set. I remain steadfastly positive that we can preserve the history of our school in another school.

The history of Rosalie has an equally, if not, a better story to tell, than many other Brisbane Colleges. Reflecting on the quality of education Rosalie provided in an era where the bulk of its students came from working class backgrounds, we can only be in awe of the outstanding young men who grew into champion leaders in the community.

Men who excelled in many fields including religious life, politics, the legal profession, the medical profession, law enforcement, the defence forces, media, education business, sports, and citizens who built their reputations as diligent workers in the community and good men who helped mould our beloved state and country. Their contributions helped make it a wonderful place to live and raise a family.



Thank you for listening to me today and I hope you will join with me on our continuing journey to ensure **The Spirit of Rosa** lives on.

Twenty years ago, when Timor-Leste finally gained its hard-fought independence, the Australian Marist Brothers asked the Church in Timor-Leste how it might contribute to the country. The Bishop of Bacau invited the Brothers to set up a teacher training college, and so ICFP Teacher Training College was started. Using the teaching curriculum from the Australian Catholic University, this college has become one of the strongest beacons of hope for quality education in the small country. Graduates return to their communities not only with excellent academic qualifications but also with a Marist love for and commitment to the young people they serve. Trainee teachers come from across the country and AMS is seeking more sponsors to ensure that there are no barriers to every child receiving a top-quality education from a well-trained and committed teacher.

We believe the best way to support these groups is to allocate a portion of money that is raised each year and donate it in the name of old boys who have passed away in that calendar year. At the annual AGM we will move a motion to donate funds to the project of choice for that year.

We remain optimistic that this **CAN** happen. We need external organisations to give us on-going support to make the dream come true.


