Each year our Association sends an Easter message to our members and in the last year we have seen an outbreak of war with the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. Now our region is feeling threatened by the Chinese invading Taiwan and if this eventuates it will cause further turmoil

throughout our region and Asia.

As I scanned the internet, I was looking for a suitable Easter message and came across one from Pope Francis and thought to myself, "I don't think I can find anything more suitable than this message for the times we live in. We should sit up and take heed of his words".

I hope all our members and their families have a Happy and Holy Easter and they stay safe and well in an environment which is challenging all of us in so many ways.



#### Pope Francis Easter Message for the world - 2023

Please, please, let us not get used to war! Let us all commit ourselves to imploring peace, from our balconies and in our streets! Peace!" Thus proclaimed Pope Francis in his Easter message "Urbi et Orbi" ("To the City and the World").

"May the leaders of nations hear people's plea for peace," he urged. "May they listen to that troubling question posed by scientists almost seventy years ago: 'Shall we put an end to the human race, or shall mankind renounce war?" (see: "Russell-Einstein Manifesto" <a href="https://bit.ly/3L8lQqi">https://bit.ly/3L8lQqi</a>).

To the detriment of our world, leaders of nations ignore this sobering common-sense auestion.

Nation after nation continues to pour money into war-making and war preparation.

According to the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute, world governments are now spending a combined total of \$2 trillion per year on their militaries. With just a fraction of that amount of money, we could eliminate world poverty and hunger.

In his Easter message to the world, Pope Francis also highlights the cry of all the "children who suffer throughout our world: those

dying of hunger or lack of medical care, those who are victims of abuse and violence, and those denied the right to be born" (see: <a href="https://bit.ly/3vavDg0">https://bit.ly/3vavDg0</a>).

Greed, power, nationalism, political influence given to weapons corporations, rationalization, careers and selfish political strategizing are among the illogical and immoral reasons that war and war preparation continues.

Furthermore, the nine nations that possess nuclear weapons continue to spend additional money to modernize their nuclear arsenals. For instance, the U.S. is in the process of a wasteful, dangerous 30-year modernization plan costing more than \$1.7 trillion.

Pope Francis has declared that even possessing nuclear weapons is immoral! Yet most Catholics – both laity and clergy – remain unmoved by the leader of the Catholic Church's denunciation of even having nuclear weapons.

Thus, the major reason that world leaders are not listening to the highly moral call to nonviolent peacemaking and multilateral nuclear disarmament is because most citizens are silent. It is a sad and dangerous example of the "culture of indifference" Pope Francis continues to warn against.

One of the notable exceptions to this unholy silence is Archbishop John Wester, who leads the Archdiocese of Santa Fe in New Mexico. He recently wrote a pastoral letter titled "Living in the Light of Christ's Peace: A Conversation Toward Nuclear Disarmament" in which he states "Pope Francis has made clear statements about the immorality of possessing nuclear weapons, moving the Church from past conditional acceptance of 'deterrence' to the moral imperative of abolition" (see: <a href="https://archdiosf.org/living-in-the-light-of-christs-peace">https://archdiosf.org/living-in-the-light-of-christs-peace</a>). And it is worth noting that inspiring Gospel-centered active nonviolent organizations like Pace e Bene/Campaign Nonviolence (see: <a href="https://paceebene.org/campaign-nonviolence">https://paceebene.org/campaign-nonviolence</a>) and The International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN) are helping to build a world free of nuclear weapons and of all forms of violence.

Australia has not signed the United Nations' <u>Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons</u>. Bishop Terry Brady, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference Delegate for Social Justice, has <u>called on the Australian Government to sign the Treaty</u> and work towards its ratification. Bishop Brady says that the use of nuclear weapons is immoral as they are inherently indiscriminate and their impact is uncontainable in time and space. Furthermore, their continued existence "poses an unacceptable risk of deliberate or accidental use, and it diverts resources from the things that positively foster peace".

But we still have a long dangerous way to go. The insanity continues. War, war preparation – including nuclear annihilation preparation – continues unabated.

And so, the troubling question posed by scientists almost 70 years ago, and raised again by Pope Francis in his Easter message to the world remains before us: "Shall we put an end to the human race, or shall mankind renounce war?"

Concluding his Easter message on a hopeful and challenging note our Holy Father says, "Faced with the continuing signs of war, as well as the many painful setbacks to life, Jesus Christ, the victor over sin, fear and death, exhorts us not to surrender to evil and violence. Brothers and sisters, may we be won over by the peace of Christ! Peace is possible; peace is a duty; peace is everyone's primary responsibility!"

#### **LEADERS FORUM**

The leader's forum was held in the Rosalie Room at The Marist Centre on 26<sup>th</sup>. March, which is in the Marist Ashgrove school precinct. The Marist Centre is a separate building and does not come under the management of the College.

The group that attended was small but inclusive. There were twenty-two attendees in the room and a further ten members joined us via zoom. With the help of Marist Ashgrove, we were able to resource excellent technical skills to ensure the event would run smoothly and without hindrance.

We wanted to invite as many Captains and Vice-Captains as possible, but with Rosalie Old Boys scattered across our country and the entire globe, we had to cast the net wider to invite people to cover every possible year. Those that attended were passionate about contributing to the future of our Association.

Approximately three weeks before the event, we emailed a survey to attendees so we could evaluate the current service we were providing to our members and we had an excellent response. We also even received responses from those members who were unable to attend the event on the day. This provided us with valuable intelligence about how to set the scene for our presentations.

One of the questions on the survey asked members for suggestions and we received an extensive list, which delighted us. This has given us a "bucket list" to work on. Our intention is to prioritise some of these and action them in as short a time as possible.



We learned from our attendees that members do not want our Association to be just a "social club". They were very appreciative that high on our list of priorities was to develop a "Sense of Purpose". At the conclusion of the forum, the members completed an evaluation sheet. The rating for that topic was, that attendees viewed this as the most valuable part of the forum. Seventy-five per cent placed it at the top of the list.



We believe that the Rosalie legacy should be to follow in the footsteps of Marcellin Champagnat, whose main mission in founding the Marist Brothers was to teach Brothers to work with children deprived of Christian education, in remote rural areas.

This work by members of the Marist Order continues today. We know some of our fellow Old Boys including Br. Adrian Story and Br. Tony Burrows, Br. Peter Corr (the last Marist Brother Principal of Rosalie) amongst many others, are working to educate local people in remote communities to provide an education and train teachers so that younger people receive the education they deserve.

#### History of the Rosalie Jersey at Marist College Ashgrove

I received an email from fellow Old Boy John Richards, who kindly gave me history on the Rosalie Tribute Game and the Jerseys. John was part of the group that was originally involved in organising the event.

In 2009, following the closure of Marist College Rosalie, a group of five Rosalie old boys, four of whom had sons attending Marist College Ashgrove, spoke about and canvased ideas to help perpetuate the memory of Brisbane's first Marist school. A number of suggestions were made, and as most of the old boys had sons who participated in rugby at Marist College Ashgrove, and understood the importance of the game at the school, decided that providing a playing strip for the 1st XV to be worn once a year in trial games played by the college would be a good way to achieve their goal.

A number of these persons who were also involved much earlier in the purchase and the inauguration of the Marist Cup played between the two colleges annually. While that cup was only contested a few times, it remains pride of place in the Tower Block exhibition at Marist College Ashgrove. In the last playing of the game for the Marist Cup Rosalie, against all odds, managed to draw the game 7-7, a fitting way to conclude the competition.

Following the closure of the college the first Rosalie jersey to be worn by Marist College Ashgrove 1st XV was in 2010 against Toowoomba Grammar at Suncorp Stadium in a curtain raiser to the Reds Super Rugby game. The group of Joe Nowak, Martin Silec, John Wiltshire, Chris Goddard and John Richards donated the strip. The games continued annually and in 2017 when the gold strip didn't arrive in time for competition fixtures the Rosalie jersey was

worn for the first three competition games setting the team

on course for an undefeated year.

The first jersey, which continued for three years, was a cerise, blue and gold hoop design. Later designs incorporated the cerise and blue colours with gold numbering. In all three different strips were purchased by the old boy's group, until the point was reached in 2019 when the Rosalie Old Boys Association took over the organising of the strip.

For each of the ten years that the original group organised the playing kit, presentations were made to the playing group and the history of the Marist journey in Queensland and its special place in Marist education in Queensland was imparted to the players.

#### **Rugby Archives**

A couple of weeks ago I received an interesting email from one of our most respected and outstanding Old Boys from the 1950's, Hector Macdonald.

I have reprinted Hector's email below together with two fascinating pieces of memorabilia, one being a program and the other details of the 1965 Office Bearer's for the Marist Rosalie Old Boys' Association.

Dear Jim,

I shall attend the Ashgrove v St Laurence's game on 22nd April.

I have attached a copy of the program of Saturday June 1<sup>st</sup>, 1957, at the Brisbane Exhibition Ground in which Ashgrove played St Laurence's College. I don't know who won. The best game of the day was Marist Brothers, Rosalie v St Peter's. We came second. You will note my name was spelled McDonald. I explained to nine different Brothers at Rosalie over nine consecutive years from 1949-1957, that my name was Macdonald and not McDonald. None of them could understand. When I received a prize as Dux of the College at the end of Senior, it was awarded to Hector McDonald.

After the three Curtain Raisers at the Exhibition, the New Zealand All Blacks played Australia. Naturally, The All Blacks won.

Later that year, we played St Laurence's on their home ground at South Brisbane. We beat them 17-0.

Keep up the excellent work you are doing managing the current Rosalie Old Boys Association. I have attached a copy of a page from the 1965 Annual Magazine.

Yours truly Hector Macdonald

I am certain that guys from the 1950's and early 1960's who knew Hector well will notice that he will be attending the Rosalie Tribute Game. I hope a few Old Boys from that era can also attend the Tribute Match. It is an excellent opportunity to have a catch up.

Members of that team including Terry O'Sullivan, Barry Brown are still with us and are active Old Boys still attending events.

I have also added a third photo of the "Mighty Midgets" in the following section together with a story about their success which has been reprinted from of the 1953 Silver Jubilee Magazine. It is a story about the 6 stone 7 lb Rugby team who were the first Rosalie Rugby Team to win a premiership.

For those who are not aware 1953 was the year Br. Cyprian Dowd changed the school from playing Rugby League to Rugby Union. It was his second term in office.



Right from the kick-off it was a hard-battle, with Rosalie keeping to the tactics that won them many matches; bustling their opponents their feet by short, sharp forward rushes. Late in the first half, out shot a pass to 'Pussy' Steinhart, In-

dustrial's winger. In a flash he was over in the corner, despite all efforts of Kerry Victor to stop him. First blood to Industrial!

"Faster and faster became the play, 'the pigs', living up to their name, pushed and rucked like tigers. With five minutes of the first half left, a penalty was awarded to Rosalie. Leon Taeffe's punt landed under the posts, and after various players had sorted themselves out one by one, none other than Jim Connor was lying on the ball. It was an easy conversion for Jim, and when the players left the field, the scores stood at Rosalie five, Industrial three.

"On the resumption of play, Industrial attacked vigorously. Their tactics came to naught, however, thanks to Alan Robinson and Peter Gerry. Grimly, Industrial fought back. Then Des McDonough broke through. Sidestepping brilliantly, he cut the defence to ribbons, passed to the three-quarters who swept downfield like an avalanche. A try near the corner post resulted and Rosalie led eight to three.

"After that, Industrial wilted; Taeffe scored from a penalty, and a few minutes later a magnificent solo run by Ken Speedy ended under the posts. Connor had hardly time to convert when the whistle sounded. Rosalie had won sixteen to three, and were joint premiers. A jubilant war cry was all that was needed to complete a very successful game."



Ian was the second son of Alderman for the Brisbane City Council, Charlie Rowland.

Both Ian and Brother Ainslie were both educated at Marist Brother's, Rosalie and Ian completed Senior at the college in 1964.

#### Ian's Life

Ian had suffered ill health for some time and suffered a serious heart attack in 2022. Even after that event he quipped to someone; "I wasn't going to die, because I would make too many of my relatives extremely happy! (That's lan's idea of joke) The heart attack was not lan's first.



Ian always kept busy and celebrated a remarkable milestone: 50 years as an active Justice of the Peace. He is still in the top three youngest ever to be appointed a Justice of the Peace in Queensland!

Since 1964, Ian spent his life living on Coochie Mudlo in 1964, and purchased land there in 1982, building his house in 1984. 


