PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Official AGM Opening and Welcome Address – 2023 Marist Rosalie Old Boys' Association. Inc.

Good morning and welcome to the 2023 Annual General Meeting of the Marist Rosalie Old Boys Association.

I want to welcome everyone here today especially those who have travelled a long distance for this year's AGM and reunion lunch. We have guests from Northern New South Wales, the Sunshine Coast, and the Darling Downs region.

As we conclude another extremely busy, successful, and challenging year for our Marist Brothers Rosalie Old Boys' Association I want to thank those members of our committee and our supporters who put up their hand and worked tirelessly throughout 2023 to ensure our association runs smoothly.

Firstly, I would like to offer my personal thanks to one member of the team here today. I am certain anyone who has served on a committee, especially in the position as a secretary, would tell you that it is the busiest job of all. These events do not just happen and most of the work always falls back on the secretary. I must tell you that our Secretary, Jaccie Dawson never fails to deliver on what must be done; always prioritising the work of our organisation in her busy schedule.



Supporting a 'worry wart' like me can be energy sapping but she does it with genuine care for "The Old Boys." In addition to her dedication to us, Jaccie also works and volunteers her time to charity work which assists people in need. None of what happens here today would come to fruition without her dedication. Please join me in giving Jaccie a round of applause as a gesture of thanks for all the work she does for our association.

It is fitting that we acknowledge those Old Boys from the 1950's attending the AGM and/or lunch today. We have six duces from the college, Hector Macdonald, Barry



Brown, George Macionis, Alan Whimp, Stan Macionis, Chris Speare, and Joel Hodge. George and Stan Macionis were the one of only two sets of brothers who were Duxes in the school's history. We also received an apology from Stan Jewell, dux of the college for 1960.

Also joining us are former College Captains, Tony Steel (1962), Ron Gordon (1963), Peter Harris (1966), Michael Harvey (1968), Chris Speare (1973) and Michael Lynch (1998). We received apologies from other Captains Paul Stirling (1976), Danny Donaldson (1977), Danny Loch (1986) and Andrew Veprek (1990). Chris Gabbett (1992) is also a late apology due to hospitalisation of his young child. We thank Joel Hodge, Vice-Captain of the College from 1999 for being present today.

There are also several former Committee Members here today and one who is respectfully remembered and that is our former long-term President, Joe Nowak. Tony Steel, also present, was President when Rosalie celebrated the 50th. Anniversary of the school held at the Melbourne Hotel in 1979. We thank them for coming today.

During 2023 we held several events including: -

The Leader's Forum

Invited to this event were as many College Captain's and Vice Captains who were available. If it was not possible for a Captain and/or Vice Captain to attend for any given year, we suggested a representative from that year be present. Our goal was to get feedback from our members on what we were doing well and what we could do better. Following a successful forum, we produced a priority list of ideas for the future. Most of the attendees believed that we needed a sense of purpose for our Association that was deeper than a social club. Discussions strongly indicated the highest need on the list was to help underprivileged children receive the same opportunity to have a good education like we did. Timor Leste seemed the obvious choice because of the Marist connection and statistically it is arguably the poorest nation on earth.

A sub-committee was established and led by Michael Harvey. The simplest way to channel the donations to where they could best be utilised was through Australian Marist Solidarity (AMS). AMS is the international agency for the aid and development work of the Marist family in Australia and throughout Asia and the Pacific Islands.

A modest target of \$5,000 was established. I am pleased to tell you today, that thanks to our members and especially one generous benefactor, we have achieved that target. The total we have raised year to date is \$5,275. This money will educate a student for three years in The Marist tradition. We intend to continue with this campaign in 2024 and beyond, so The Rosa Spirit lives on. We need more of our



members to contribute to this worthy cause. 2.1% of our 1400 members have generously contributed and we really encourage all our members to consider joining us in championing the future of these children.

The Rosalie Rugby Tribute Match

2023 marked the 13th year the annual tribute Rugby match which is played at Ashgrove. The wonderful tradition of the Ashgrove 1st. XV boys wearing the cerise and blue colours in a game was started by three Old Boys including former President Joe Nowak, John Richards, and Martin Silec.

Three years ago, a change of Jersey was required, and it was decided that we would have them play in the Cerise and Blue Butchers stripe Jerseys that the whole of school wore back in the 1950's and early 1960's. We sold approximately two hundred jerseys to our Old Boys as a fund raiser and that money helped top up our bank account and pay for the Jerseys we donated to the players.

In 2024 or 2025 we are looking to change the current jerseys. The boys get bigger every year and outgrow the Jerseys. There is also the wear and tear factor to be considered when the game is Rugby.

There has been staunch support to change to the white knight's jersey for the coming season. The cost of donating a new set of Jerseys is approximately \$3,000 and consideration needs to be given on how we will fund this. We will be looking to our members to help raise this money.

This year a large crowd watched the game and enjoyed refreshments and finger food. Our Old Boys presented the Rosalie Jerseys to the team members before the game which is an honour for the boys. I remember the first year of the presentation clearly and was pleasantly surprised how much the boys knew of the History of our school.

A suggestion has been made to retrieve the existing Jerseys from Ashgrove and donate those to Timor Leste as a good will gesture and a memento from our school. The Committee will research this in the coming weeks.

The Sports Lunch

The Marist Sport's Lunch is held annually during Champagnat week and is hosted by Marist College Ashgrove.

Invitees include Old Boys from both Ashgrove and Rosalie who represented the 1st. XV with the same trailing digit as the current year. For example, this year students from both Colleges from 1953, 1963, 1973 and 1983 attended this lunch and presentation. These fine athletes were presented to the crowd on the main oval and awarded a memorial medallion to mark the event. Rosa was well represented this



year. We had one attendee from 1953, John Quinn. Some of you will recall that 1953 was the first year our school changed from Rugby League to Rugby Union.

The Annual Marist Vintage Lunch

In 2013 we were invited to organise tables for Rosa old Boys which at that time was called the blue and gold lunch. This event was originally hosted by Ashgrove for Old Boys who attended their school more than forty years ago. It was then extended to invite Rosalie Old Boys and we have had regular attendance since then. Two years ago, we convinced Ashgrove to change the name from The Blue and Gold Lunch to the Marist Vintage Lunch and over time approximately 20-60 Rosa have joined in celebrating our history at the quality lunch each year. It would be great to see even more familiar faces in 2024.

This year we had a remarkably interesting Old Boy attend this lunch. His name was Richard Rosenstengel and he attended Rosalie between 1934 and 1938 leaving school to join the family business. Richard was a family member of the famous Rosenstengel Furniture Manufacturers who made high quality furniture in Brisbane in the pre-world War II period. If you have some Rosenstengel pieces in your possession today it is quite rare and valuable.

Some of you here today have attended the vintage lunch event and it is a most enjoyable day. We do have to listen to some of Ashgrove's achievements, but we are slowly infiltrating the event through our presence. We have the opportunity for a Rosalie Old Boy to address all attendees at the lunch, and it is a good opportunity to talk about the history of our school. More attendees from Rosa means we can have a considerable influence on the theme and direction of the event.

Membership System

One of the benefits we gained from holding the Leader's Forum was assistance from one of our Old Boys, Chris Byrnes. Chris operates a software business in Brisbane called Klyp and with the help of another Old Boy Chris Speare, transitioned our database from the clumsy legacy system we were using, to his product, HubSpot. HubSpot is a sophisticated CRM system which has more features and functions than we need, but it is superior to the system we were using previously.

We still have work to do within the HubSpot domain and we need to decide on how much of the application's functionality we want to embrace. Currently using HubSpot has cost us nothing, however if we do choose to take on more of the functionality it will come at a cost. Therefore, we need to evaluate using these features on a cost/ benefit analysis.



Membership Fees

When we re-established the Association in 2018, we had no intention of introducing an annual fee for our membership. We want to provide more services to our old boys. To continue our projects comes at a cost. Today one of the resolutions we will introduce is an annual membership fee for our association.

The fee amount we propose is \$25. We intend to send out notices early in the New Year and the \$25 charge will cover membership until June 30th. 2025.

We believe \$25 is a reasonable amount to be a member of our Association and not a financial burden. We encourage you to support this initiative so we can continue to provide you a strong association.

If you decide to become a full member by paying the annual fee, there will be further benefits in the future. These will be announced in due course.

Donations

It is true to say some of our old boys have been very generous with donations. Only recently we received a \$5,000 donation from one old boy who has requested he remain anonymous.

From his donation he asked that \$2,500 be given to The Australian Marist Solidarity Fund we are supporting, \$1,250 was to be given to our General Fund and the remaining \$1,250 set aside for another fund which I will talk about shortly. The money given to AMS enabled us to make our donation target as I mentioned earlier and will provide education for a student for 3 years.

Marist Rosalie Centenary

In 2029 The Centenary of the Marist Rosalie School will be celebrated, and in the New Year we will be commencing discussions on how best to mark this important occasion.

One suggestion that has been tabled is that we produce a publication in the form of a book to honour the event.

We have a large amount of material including photographs and stories which date back to the founding of the school. We have details of notable alumni who attended the College and providing we can muster the right skills and enthusiasm I believe we can achieve an excellent result.

We already have our first contribution of \$1,250 for this fund and I have been in recent consultation with potential donors who are interested in being sponsors for this project. It is a challenging project, and we need to commence developing a roadmap to the centenary as soon as possible.



Summary

Finally, I want to thank those members who are stepping down from the Committee today including, Stan Macionis, Hien Le, and Richard Marszalek. Stan is President elect of the Polish Club and that will occupy much of his time in the coming year. We value the knowledge, skills, time, and effort Stan has put into our association and his generous offer to collaborate on future projects when time permits. I want to especially mention Richard who undertook the combined role of Treasurer and Secretary when he joined the committee. What a superb job he did. Every committee needs a Richard. He is meticulous due to his wonderful eye for detail. I know on many occasions he has picked me up on small errors that made my life much simpler. Thank you, Richard. Please show your appreciation for the service these guys performed in the usual way.

A few years ago, I stated that 2023 would be my final year as President. I have undertaken a scrutinous and reflective discernment process over these last months and only made my final decision in the last two weeks. I intend with your endorsement to remain in the position for one more year. I am hopeful that in twelve months' time we have found some younger guys to take over the reins of the Association. You cannot run a membership organisation of any magnitude without embracing technology. The younger generation have a massive advantage with their knowledge of the applications and systems that make life simpler. I worked in the IT industry for over forty years, and I can tell you in all honesty technology is starting to pass me by. It is a young person's domain.

In retrospect, when we started this journey back in 2018, it seemed an enormous challenge without having an active school and a lot of historical records, but I must tell you that I have enjoyed the work and camaraderie immensely. In those first years, there was me, Henry Zuk, Chris Begley, Tony Buckley, and Tony Farrell. Tony Farrell and I are the last survivors of the original group. Over time, there were some outstanding guys who attended Rosa, and many have become leaders in our community. I feel honoured to have met many of them and listened to their Rosa stories.

We receive numerous accolades from old boys, not just those residing in Australia but from all over the globe and it deeply resonates with me that what we are doing is worthwhile.

Together our committee has achieved an enormous amount since we resurrected the association including producing twenty newsletters, numerous bulletins, building a website and locating missing old boys. We have created more events than most active school old boys' associations do and most importantly we have brought past



mates back together. Our goal has always remained the same. To ensure that the Spirit of Rosa lives on.

Finally, I want to offer my sincere gratitude to every person here today. Your gift of patience, loyalty and friendship is a blessing in my life. I truly value all you do to make my role in the old boy's association both easy and rewarding. I will always advocate for and support the Association where I can whether it is a personal chat, a cuppa, a committee meeting, or a large-scale event. I will bring it 100% of the time.

Thank you for listening to me today and I hope you will join with me on our continuing journey to ensure The Spirit of Rosa lives on.

AGM RESOLUTIONS – MEMBERSHIP FEES

At our AGM we also passed several resolutions. The most important of these was to introduce a membership fee to for our Old Boys to become a full member of our Association. The **amount approved was \$25** and we will commence **billing our members early in 2024**.

Our Association cannot continue to function without funds and while we have received some generous donations, we have ongoing expenses that need to be met. We make small profits from functions throughout the year, but we have run at a loss for the past two years and our current bank balance has fallen below where it needs to be. This cannot continue and we had no option but to introduce a membership fee.

The motion was met with overwhelming support at the AGM, and we do need our Old Boys to pay this amount when they receive the invoice.

Trainee teachers come from across the country and AMS is seeking more sponsors to ensure that there are no barriers to every child receiving a top-quality education from a well-trained and committed teacher.
