## HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

Rosalie was the first school opened by the Marist Brothers in Queensland. The blessing of the foundation stone took place on July 29, 1928 and the plaque on the Brothers' Monastery states the ceremony was performed by His Excellency the Most Reverend B. Catteneo, the Apostolic Delegate. His Grace, the Most Reverend J. Duhig, Archbishop of Brisbane, and the Very Reverend Dean W. Lee, P.P. were also present at the ceremony; the Marist Brothers were represented by Br. Reginald Moore, the Director of our school at Lismore.

That Christmas three brothers arrived to open the school: Brother Osmund Rice, Director; Brother Athanasius Raess and Brother Campion Muldoon. Brother Osmund has left us the following account:

We opened school on January 28. That week one hundred and thirty-five were enrolled, a large number from the Convent school, Rosalie. A report was circulated through the district that the school would be a very expensive one in fees, that the books would cost pounds, and the hat band alone not less than ten shillings. Monsignor Lee was much annoyed about the report and referred to it on the following Sunday. By the end of February the roll was one hundred and seventy-five. The grades were third, fourth and fifth.

The school was approved as a secondary school in April, 1929, and at the end of that year five boys won scholarships: D. Brimson, G. Jones, J. Bermingham, J. Silk and T. Cochran.

A few boarders were taken in during the first year and the number was seven in 1930. The College continued to take a limited number of boarders during the thirties but this ceased with the opening of Marist Brothers' College, Ashgrove, in 1940. That year all the boarders and one hundred and twenty day boys transferred to Ashgrove.

1935 saw the appointment of Brother Cyprian Dowd as the second Director of Rosalie. His name dominates the history of the College over these fifty years as he was Director twice and thus spent a total of twelve years as headmaster of the College. In 1935 the cottage which had previously been on the lower part of the property, was brought to the top of the hill, remodelled, refitted and generally transferred into two classes and a dormitory. He and the Brothers and parents over the years levelled out the present playground levels. By 1939 the College roll was four hundred and fifty-one.

The present Senior College was built during the term of office of Brother Gilbertus and Monsignor J. McCarthy. It was officially blessed and opened by Archbishop Duhig on October 2, 1949 and cost 35,000 pounds. A crowd of nearly two thousand people attended the opening and gave more than eight hundred pounds to the College building fund. The Premier, Mr E.M. Hanlon and the Works Minster, Mr Power, were also present at the opening.

In 1955 Brother Cyprian acquired four hectares of land at Fig Tree Pocket for playing fields. The Parents and Friends' Association backed the acquisition which cost about \$20,000. Four football fields, a dressing shed, and caretaker's residence have been built there. The fields are known as "Lavalla", named after the town where Blessed Marcellin Champagnat founded the first school in France in 1817. Brother Cloman added further sporting facilities to the College with the building of a swimming pool. The pool was opened in May, 1965, by Monsignor McCarthy. Again the Parents and Friends took on the responsibility of the construction which cost \$12,500.

Federal government assistance enabled a science block to be built and opened on 16th November, 1969. This work was supervised by the Director, Brother Ernan. During the headmastership of Brother Brian Sweeney, a library was built beneath the laboratories and the basement of the Senior College transferred into a carpeted hall. Both these projects were completed in 1975. The final work done in this area was the building of a covered assembly and shelter area adjacent to the Senior block. This work took place in 1977 and the Federal government contributed \$12,000 of the total \$14,000 cost.

In 1970 Rosalie became an "Archdiocesan College"; that means the College became the responsibility of the Archdiocese of Brisbane although it continued to be administered locally by the Marist Brothers. That same year work began on the building of a Junior College on the property below the Parish Church.

This fine building was built by the Archdiocese at a cost of \$142,000 and opened on 6th June, 1971. Archbishop P.M. O'Donnell and his Auxiliary, Bishop H. Kennedy were both present at the opening. The Junior College has been administered by Brother Terence O'Brien (1971-74), Brother Anthony Shears (1957-76) and Mr B. McGill.


In July 1978 the Archdiocesan Education Council decided that from 1979 no Year Five students be taken and the Primary section of the College phased out by 1981. The principal reasons for this decision were the declining numbers in the inner city parishes and the trend for boys to stay at their local parish schools to finish their primary education. The primary building will become part of the secondary College in 1980.

As the number of children in the inner city suburbs continues to decline the future of Marist Brothers' College, Rosalie will depend more and more on the parishes along the Western train line. While the Rosalie parish still has the highest number of students at the College more and more dependence will be on the Kenmore, Corinda, Indooroopilly, Darra, Toowong, Graceville and Inala parishes.


In this, the Golden Jubilee Year, the staff look ahead with confidence to continue the tradition of zeal, academic excellence, parental involvement and family

Secondary classrooms and dormitory building on the Middle Terrace. This building was brought up from Beck Street in 1934, and retained until 1948.




The souvenir programme of the opening stated:








